My Brother's Obituary

Scott was born February 15, 1959, in Midland, Michigan and lived the majority of his life in northern Michigan. He was a painter, a cyclist, a skier, loved camping and the outdoors. Scott was also an alcoholic, and that addiction eventually overrode the good things in his life. He passed away July 4, 2022, in Alpena, Michigan. From alcohol related complications.

It wasn't always like that. Alcoholism takes its time, comes and goes for years. Scott was athletic, adventurous, hardworking, and meticulous. Over the years each episode put a different spin on what was happening, the alcoholism had taken hold of all of us in some way. All those who loved Scott, regardless of his challenges, took turns trying to find a way to help him. Many times, he would agree, go to rehab, find a therapist, go to AA meetings. All sporadic attempts to set things right.

He had solid phases of sobriety and would re-engage in amazing work, family, cycle hundreds of miles and his place was always immaculate. Like many who struggle with addiction, Scott was brilliant at disguising his daily battles. Each relapse ran deeper than the previous. Alcoholism wasn't a lifestyle Scott chose, he hoped for a better, happier, healthier life on the other side of sobriety. Sadly, time ran out.

My brother found sobriety twice through Harbor Hall. He became a part of our lives again for a year the first time and for about three years the second time. I will cherish those memories. I will always be grateful to Harbor Hall and I am blessed to work for the Harbor Hall Foundation.

Clinic & Administration Building (Phase I)

We completed construction on the first building in 2021. It houses the medical clinic, women's residential treatment center, lecture hall and administration offices. Since opening just over a year ago, over 100 women have been in treatment and there is a waiting list. The primary care facility is used by not only those currently receiving treatment, but also those who have completed treatment.

Sober Living Apartments (Phase II)

Construction began last fall on the sober living apartments. When completed in late 2022 or early 2023, there will be 32 beds. The building has four hallways, two on each floor, and each hallway has two "pods" with two bedrooms. With the current housing shortage, the need is great.

Phase III

The final phase will begin in 2023 and includes a new kitchen/dining area along with a community area in the lower level of the sober living apartments.

Maintenance in progress

The interiors of the existing transitional housing have been updated and the men's residential building and the transitional housing have been re-roofed. New telephone and data systems were installed and a campus wide security system has been put in place.

Harbor Hall by the Numbers

FISCAL YEAR 2022

OCT 1, 2021-SEPT 30, 2022

This past year, there were 378 individuals seeking intensive substance use care. 295 were men and 83 were women. 228 of those clients transitioned successfully through treatment and back into their communities.

This gives a success rate of 66%. Those clients that were successful, were able to remain on campus receiving treatment for a 188 day average. In an industry that is struggling to find balance between performance based outcomes and highest quality, we are doing both.

During the 2022 FY we treated 168 clients for alcohol. 133 stimulant addicted clients received care. 75 clients with heroin and opioid addictions received treatment.
